The Museum of Erotica

I had such a good time in Barcelona last September. On the first morning, I walked along the famous La Rambla that leads from the city centre down to the seafront. Halfway down, I discovered the Museum of Erotica, opposite the Bouqueria, the fruit and veg market.

The museum opened at 10.00 am and I was one of their early visitors. Situated on the first floor, I was greeted by a huge carved phallus, about 7-foot high, which was quite a shock. This led me to the Oriental section, and a display of Shunga, or images of spring, an Asian euphemism for sex.

At first I was trailed by two Japanese schoolgirls who tittered their way through the forbidden art of ancient Japan. I particularly liked the porcelain collection, with its delicate paintings, that traditionally a mother would give her daughter on the eve of her wedding to show what was expected of a new bride

I quickly lost my two giggling geishas and found my way to the lovely miniatures of the Kama Sutra, and a large collection of hand-carved wooden and marble dildos. On display were strange little figurines with huge engorged penises, that originally were teaching aids for young people when they culturally came of age.

Naked Apollo

The Graeco-Roman Collection and my favourite room, where I was greeted by a magnificent golden statue of a naked Apollo, beautifully proportioned and with buns to die for.

Having been brought up on the novels of Mary Renault, I love the history of ancient Greece and Rome. In this room you got your money's worth. Photos, references, frescoes of group orgies, sodomy, fellatio – it was bliss! Homosexual practices were widely accepted in Ancient Rome, as long as Romans had the active role, and slave or non-Roman the passive one. Political enemies of Julius Caesar, for example, alleged that he was "the husband of all women and the woman of all husbands", spreading rumours that Caesar had been the passive lover of kings.

I was surprised at how large the museum's collection was, over 800 pieces, ranging from around the world. I loved a set of glazed phallic salt-and-pepper pots from Russia. There were reproductions of paintings from the grand masters of art, like Velazquez, Goya and Klimt through to the limited edition illustrations of the 18th and 19th centuries. Even Picasso and Salvador Dali explored the female form through exaggerated geometric shapes.

Tucked away behind a curtain was a small cinema showing the private video collection of King Alfonso XIII. By today's standards all rather tame, but made in 1926 and filmed in Barcelona's red-light district, it showed titillating cuddles between coy ladies and randy men, in what I call 'Charlie Chaplin' style.. These were the first pornographic films to be seen in Spain and they seeded the start of the Spanish film industry.

The Erotic Garden

It came as a relief, to discover a magical quiet space set out like a roof garden, with arabesque tiles, plants and a photographic fresco along one wall. This was the Erotic Garden, displaying the natural world at its suggestive best, from long-stemmed hairy cacti to the delicate vulva-shaped petals of orchids. You don't think of tortoises having sex – but they do, as the photo-montage on the wall proved. This was a lovely garden, and I noticed that one could hire it for events and parties.

The Red Room

There was so much to see that I risked suffering from information overload, but what sticks in my mind was the Red Room. A display of fetishism and sadomasochism – whips, chains, handcuffs, the lot. Lurking in a corner and firmly bolted to the floor was a most uncomfortable looking 'thrusting' or pleasure machine. A beautiful piece of engineering, with cogs and wheels, and a central prong that held the dildo of choice.

The two staff on duty were very friendly and they explained that the museum had opened in 1997 and was hugely popular with visitors. The corridor down to the street was lined with quotes from famous people. I laughed at Jackie Kennedy's remark that "sex is a bad thing because it rumples the clothes." I left the Museum of Erotica with a huge smile and an urgent need for a coffee.

Love is Strange

Without any media hype or fanfares, this American gay film arrived in cinemas during February of this year. Directed by Ira Sachs, it tells the story of a gay couple both in their 70's, who have shared their lives for 39 years. They get married in Manhattan and immediately George (played by the excellent Alfred Molina) is dismissed from his job at a Catholic School. As they can no longer afford the mortgage on their apartment, they are forced to sell it and down-size, as well as go downmarket. In the interim George moves in with two gay policemen in the flat below, whilst Ben (played by John Lithgow) moves in with nephew's family. Numerous problems arise for the parted couple before they are happily re-united. This is a truly superb film, treating gays as adult human beings and not as silly wild caricatures as in many stage, and screen portravals. The sub all to do with love and relationships, are not necessarily rounded off and the cinema-goer is left to apply his own interpretations as to their conclusions. A truly remarkable film, and one which I will doubtless see again.

The Triple Bill

During the first half of February this year, I made three visits to the theatre: this is a brief resume: in London's Apollo theatre, I saw a revival of the 1994 gay play "My Night With Reg" written by Kevin Ellyot with the AIDS epic as a background. In his garden flat a supper party is given by Guy in memory of the recent passing of his friend Reg. Five men turn up, and as the meal is being prepared, they reminisce and talk about their love – lives and conquests. It slowly emerges that at one time or another each guest had slept with Reg, and so disbelief and jealousies soon begin to surface. As the evening progresses some of the guests pair off and disappear into the bushes in the garden, and another couple have a row and one goes home by himself. The characters portrayed were either drama queens, near alcoholics, or in one case, a twink, and the play lacked totally in humour. But it was slickly acted and presented in typical West End style: there was much nudity in the closing scenes of the play.

My Second visit was to Covent Garden to see John Cranko's 1965 Ballet **ONEGIN**, which followed the story of Eugene Onegin that is usually presented as an opera. With Tchaikovsky's exquisite music adapted by Kurt Heinz Stoize,

the leading role was danced by Thiago Soares: Tatiana by Marianeia Nunez and her sister by Akana Takada. With superb settings, beautiful costumes, and imaginative choreography, a vivid and intense atmosphere was created of early 19th century St. Petersburg. The story concerns crossed lovers, intrigue, betrayal and eventual tragic consequences. This happens to be one of my favourite ballets and one of which I will never tire of seeing. My Third visit to theatre-land, was to see Fanny Hill, staring Caroline Quentin: written as a novel in 1748 by John Cleland, it was adapted for the stage by April de Amgelis and presented as a world premier at the Bristol Old Vic. The action as bawdy and explicit; the specially composed ditties and dance displays, the vintage costumes and crisp dialogue all contributed towards a lively evening set in the Bristol docks! With meticulous care given to research, it was disappointing that the whole presented on a set consisting of box cubes at different levels with no effort having being made to capture the eighteenth century period. But the cast worked hard and were accordingly rewarded by an enthusiastic audience.
