

Bill Carridine

Bill Carridine, who was GayWest Treasurer, 2007-2008, died on 16 December 2014, aged 64. We extend our sympathy and sincere condolences to his partner, Philip.

John Pritchett (1937-2014)

John Pritchett made an enormous contribution to GayWest, serving on the committee from 1981 to 1994, with one break. He was twice Chairperson, from September 1984 to September 1986 and again from September 1991 to September 1992. At various times he also acted as Campaign, Membership and General Secretaries. Below, we print tributes from Bob Johnson and Martin Pickard. They provide a portrait of the man and also, during LGTB History Month, of the times. Editor.



John was born in 1937, when homosexuality was illegal and to be prosecuted for sex with another man could result in a hefty prison sentence and certain public humiliation. John suppressed his homosexuality for a substantial part of his early life, getting married in the early sixties as very many men in his situation did. A few

years after the decriminalisation of homosexuality in 1967, he separated from his wife and began to explore his gay inclinations.

I think that this background helps explain John's desire to help others coming to terms with their homosexuality and lead a life that was right for them. John and I met through Bristol C.H.E (Campaign for Homosexual Equality) and the Bristol Gay Centre. In the early eighties C.H.E. formed Gay Community Organisations to support and fund it's campaigning groups; from this Gay West was born. When, as Treasurer of Bristol C.H.E., I transferred it's very meagre funds and membership over to the newly formed Gay West I had no idea of how successful and influential the new group would become. John and I were involved with the new Gay West as committee members from its inception, with John serving as Chair of GW for a number of years. GW in the early days was regarded as auite a radical organisation and the media sought its views on a number of occasions. John even appeared on T.V. to discuss the plight of married gay men when many gay men (myself included) were not ready to be that open.

For John and myself, it was the best and worst of times. The best of times for us on a personal basis as we sold our separate homes and bought a house so that we could live together, a course of action that caused problems with some family members. However, as we were leading the life we wanted and had each other, we felt quite equal to taking on bigotry and prejudice whether from family or society in general. It was the worst of times in that it coincided with the start of the HIV/AIDS 'epidemic' and we saw gay men vilified in many parts of an increasingly hysterical media as disease ridden perverts who should be sent to

internment camps away from 'decent' society. John quickly rose to the challenge and joined the Aled Richards Trust – later to merge with the Terence Higgins Trust – and amongst other things manned a telephone help line in his spare time.



GayWest went from strength to strength during this time and John put in a lot of effort to help make the group the success it was, organising events, acting as the public face of GW and generally facilitating the running of the group. John and I acted as telephone contacts for GW for a number of years, talking to people who were trying to come to terms with their sexuality at all times of the day and night.

John Pritchett (contd.)

Abusive calls at 2am were especially unwelcome! It was not all hard graft, however; we all had a lot of fun as well, attending the many activities that featured each month in the magazine. Holidays were organised by GW members, including a fortnight in Portugal (the naturist beach for some reason seemed to be especially popular with a large number of the GW committee!), a long weekend in Paris (the hotel was so awful it was funny) and a number of trips to the Cliff House Hotel in Torquay. Several Christmas holidays were spent in The Mead at Bath. GW was an integral part of our lives for quite a number of years and going to Coffee Shop was a normal part of Saturday morning, we didn't have to think about it, Saturday was Coffee Shop and lunch at the Garricks Head afterwards.

John and I went our separate ways in the late nineties but were always able to remain on good terms. I found a new partner and John was lucky enough to find his soul mate in Martin who provided him with much love and support, especially in his last year when he developed a brain tumour.

So, I hope that I have been able to do justice to the John that I knew as someone whose basic instinct was to help others and who was willing to stand up in public and fight for gay rights. John was not without a sense of humour and as a man who had been Out & Proud for decades, I think that he would have been well aware of the irony that none of this was mentioned at his funeral oration.

John and I were together for fifteen years. The first few years whilst I was living in Warwickshire we would meet every weekend alternating between my home and his in Saltford. Our friendship blossomed quickly and, at some unknown point, became a relationship, which was cemented by the many things we had in common, including a passion for old cars, cynicism of the modern world and an evening G & T.

John was a kind, generous and sociable guy, organising nights out, or tea/dinner parties for friends, where he would go to a lot of trouble to cook and present the meal. He was a very focussed, fastidious and well organised person, but not controlling. John loved his garden, taking great pride in his lawn – and its straight edges!

His last eleven months, after being diagnosed with a brain tumour, were not easy. He gradually lost his taste, mobility and independence, but he never took out his fear or frustration on others, maintaining a calm dignity to the end. He died peacefully in his sleep of a chest infection – for which he had refused treatment.

John was a lovely man and my best friend. Oh... and he made areat cakes! Martin Pickard
