Coming Out

On 31 December my beloved and I were married. While this of course has great meaning in our own personal histories, it just so happens it has wider historical significance. The reason being we are both women and one of the first same sex couples to be wed in Scotland. You'd be forgiven for thinking that given the historic nature of the event I was out and proud. But when the time came to share my marital status with the wider world, I realised I was scared.

Desiring minimal fuss, we informed only a few close friends and family members of our plans to wed. On returning to work I was hit with the dilemma of what to do when people asked how the Christmas holiday was. I didn't want to edit out the fact I was a newlywed, but every time I had a "how was your holiday" chat I faltered. I am new to my job, and as awkward as the wedding news was for me to share, the news of my gayness is equally so. The end result being only a handful of people at work know, so in delivering the wedding news I was also coming out.

So out and proud or in and mortified? I used to think I was the former but over the past month I have been forced to reconsider. I now recognise the root of my fear is rejection. I don't have an issue with people knowing I'm gay, I am just uncomfortable being the one who tells. When I say "my wife" I am looking for your reaction. I am studying your face for a change of expression, I am listening keenly to your tone when you respond. Because what I have done is to peel back a layer of my skin. I have said "I am different, maybe not what you expect, please accept me".

Of course being gay is just one brand of difference, a widely acknowledged one. Each of us are different in our own ways, and when sharing something that gestures towards that difference we seek acceptance. Whether that's about our sexuality, mental health problems, strange and startling hobbies or obscure tastes. I have realised that in editing out aspects of my life, I have prevented the formation of real connections. I have masqueraded as someone else. A person I thought I had to be in order to gain acceptance. Recently I realise this has to stop.

The Danish Girl (film)

The Danish Girl is an upcoming American biographical drama film directed by Tom Hooper, based on the 2000 novel of the same name by David Ebershoff. The film stars Eddie Redmayne as Lili Elbe, one of the first known recipients of sexual reassignment surgery. Alicia Vikander as Gerda Wegener along with Amber Head and Matthias Schoenaerts. The film is due for release in 2016.

The Plot

In early 1920's Copenhagen, the illustrator and artist Gerda Wegener(Alicia Vikander) asks her Husband, Einar (Eddie Redmayne) to stand in for a female model. The popularity of the portraits leads to Gerda painting her husband in

further pictures as a woman. Einar developes an attraction for a female physical appearance and begins living as a woman named Lili Elbe. Ultimately Elbe becomes the first ever recipient of male to female sex reassignment surgery, and Gerda supports her decision, although their marriage becomes strained when Gerda comes to the realization that Lili is no longer the person she married.

HSBC CEO: being gay is a Career boost

Antonio Simoes, who leads HSBC UK, said being gay meant he had "more emotional intelligence" and that attitudes were shifting in the traditionally macho banking industry. He spoke out as he was named the UK'S top gay,LGBT executive. He told a newspaper in his home country of Portugal: I think being gay is an advantage... it made me a more authentic person, better able to empathise, and with more emotional intelligence. If I wasn't gay, probably I wouldn't be CEO of the bank. He said gay people now have a "personal duty at the professional level to come out of the closet".

Revealed at last, the true measure of a man (5.16inches to be exact)

When Adrian Mole measured his "thing" and found it to be 11cm long, he fueled a generation of teenage anxiety. Adrian's 4.3 inches as recorded in his 1982 fictional diary by Sue Townsend ,was for many years the only measurement for teenage boys to compare themselves against. Now British scientists have come up with a more scientific study of genital normality, which they hope will help the next generation of adolescents deal with their worries. A study of 15,000 men in 16 countries reveals the average length of a penis to be 5.16 inches (13.12cm) when erect and 3.6 inches (9.16cm) when flaccid. The conclusion was there are a range of penis measurements against population percentiles, with length when erect ranging from 1.9 inches (4.8cm) to 8.3 inches(21.2cm).

We'll pardon gays says Miliband:

Ed Miliband has vowed to adopt a "Turing's Law" to allow the pardoning of tens of thousands of men convicted of homosexual activity when it was illegal. Alan Turing was convicted in 1952 but given a posthumous royal pardon 15 months ago.

Since then, his relatives have campaigned for the 49,000 men convicted under gross indecency laws to be similarly pardoned. Under a law passed by the coalition government, anyone still alive who has a conviction or caution for consensual gay sex can apply to the home office to have their offences removed from their records. Mr Miliband has said he will extend this to the families and friends of gay men who received convictions in their lifetime but died before thy could apply to have the records changed. He told Gay Times that if elected Prime Minister in May he would make the matter a priority.

A Tour of the BBC Studios in Bristol

On a cold but sunny Saturday morning during February, I visited the BBC studios in Bristol along with a group of fifteen other people. Although security for admission was very strict, we were allowed in some areas to take photographs. Our guides were two pleasant young women who alternated from one studio to another. The first area we saw was actually the roof garden from which weather forecasts are made. Inside an innocuouslooking garden shed was a plethora of technical equipment: camera, spotlights, microphones, sound equipment and a clever reflective surface which had been incorporated into the drop-down front.

Thereafter we visited most of the important studios in the enormous complex which was established in 1934 and enlarged in 1990. Nowadays upwards of 700 people are employed there, and the news studios operate virtually 24/7. We went into the studio from which Points West is televised and saw all the autocue cameras. Other studios included those for Antiques Roadshow; The Food Program; Flog It and The Natural History Program. Some of the recording studios had wall screens which could be reversed - depending on the atmosphere wanted for a production.

Towards the end of our tour we took part in a radio drama with visitors taking roles from a given script. As the play was set in a creepy old house, there was much opportunity for ingenious sound effects. I read a sports report, and a woman did a spontaneous weather report which proved hilarious!

All in all, it was a most interesting tour which lasted two hours, and there was a question-and-answer session before we left.

There are three separate tours on Saturdays, and tours on most weekdays.

There was a interesting talk and slide show covering the past and present ways of how some people believe you can be cured of homosexual ways!!

Next it was our turn to get up and talk and after introducing ourselves, we got into the swing of things. James gave a very interesting account of Gay West's history from its foundation to the present day.

This was followed by Antony and his own personal history. Next it was open question and answer time in which some very interesting conversations were had. Particular topics included discussions on sheltered accommodation for elderly LGBT people, and what help is available for the younger generation.



There was live music and communal singing with a buffet provided, and some good conversations. All in all, a very nice afternoon's event on a cold grey February day. GayWest has become good friends with Ashfield and is part of the group's support work activities.
