## **MUMBLES, MIZZLE and MUSIC**

n a Friday in mid June in the sunniest and warmest of weather, we motored westwards over the second Severn Crossing, and headed towards Swansea. Our destination was The Towers Hotel at Jersey Marine, Swansea Bay which we found with comparative ease using Sat-Nav. The hotel proved to be comfortable, quiet and welcoming with highly efficient staff, a good restaurant and bar: our accommodation was in the annex which also housed a spa, a pool and a gym.

To one side of the hotel grounds stood a very impressive former Camera Obscurer, octagonal in shape and built of brick in 1886 by Captain Evan Evans who was the hotel's first owner. During WWII the tower was used as a US Military look-out tower: During intervening years, it has been beautifully restored, and now houses three individual guest suites, each having panoramic views over Swansea Bay and the surrounding countryside.

By next morning a MIZZLE had descended over the entire area, this is in fact, a local word for drizzle/damp and hazy conditions and so a Planned trip to the Mumbles was curtailed and a nearby shopping mall was explored instead. Saturday evening was the musical event of the weekend when three choirs combined in a nearby church to give a lively and most enjoyable and varied concert: our hosts were THE MORRISTON RFC Male Choir, and they were joined by PARTI LLWCHWR and THE MENDIP MALE VOICE CHOIR as guest singers.

After the concert there was an informal get together, an AFTERGLOW where an extensive buffet had been provided; There was also spontaneous singing and a great feeling of camaraderie. It was a very well-organised evening and one to remember for all the right reasons. On Sunday our return journey back to Bristol included a stop-over at the National Trust old tin works at BERDULAIS.

## Have you realised how expensive

#### theatre visits are now!

In the past year The Hippodrome prices have risen heavily, in fact almost to the same level as The West End.

Recently in "The Stage" paper there has been a schedule of what you expect to pay in the West End,

Examples—The most expensive is The Book of Morman at the Prince of Wales Theatre with the highest price being  $\pounds$  202.25 and the cheapest at

£40.00. Other examples—Billy Elliot £ 102 and £ 22.00

Miss Saigon £ 125 and £ 22.00 and there are many more.

I really think that the companies are pricing themselves out of business.

After all a family of four at  $\pounds 202.00 = \text{over } \pounds 800.00$  which is prohibitive.

I have also a gripe about the Theatre Royal in Bristol, about 5 years ago I attended a meeting to preserve this lovely theatre, but nobody seems to know what is happening there. If you have any information I would be delighted to know. Occasionally, we do hear of a production there, but no real advertising, as existed in the old days, most of the productions seem to be from small touring groups, but none of them can compare with The Bristol Old Vic.

I was a regular patron and have seen many of the great stars in plays there Peter O'Toole, Daniel Day Lewis, Dorothy Tutin and Timothy West just to mention a few.

But it all appears to have fallen by the wayside. The Bristol Old Vic was renowned for it's productions, yet another example of Bristol not bothering, to look after things; well that is all my moans for now, I look forward to any comments you may have. Roy Appleby.

# Travel York a Beautíful Cíty

recently spent a few days in York and the six hour couch journey was worth it. Within it's well-preserved medieval walls there is much of beauty and interest. I started with Yorvik, a representation of the Viking 10th century settlement, it is incredibly realistic, with speaking characters pursuing their everyday life in great detail.



By contrast the National Railway Museum brings together so many historic locomotives, from Stephenson's Rocket to the Japanese Bullet Train. It is fascinating to be close up to these magnificent mechanical monsters, albeit now pristine and silent. You can even glimpse the interior of Queen Victoria's private train, viewed through the windows.

York's many superb museums I loved, especially the Castle Museum, with detailed reconstructions of York streets, houses and interiors over two centuries. One was also shown prisons, brought realistically to

edieval streets and houses are everywhere very evident, in spite of the modern intrusions. The 14th Century Minster soars majestically over the city, dominating it, I climbed the 276 steps of the tower to view all from above. It almost collapsed a few years ago and needed urgent and drastic strengthening of it's foundations, all of which is shown in the Undercroft exhibition.

I cannot omit having seen the Treasurer's house cellar, where in 1953, a terrified young man witnessed and heard the procession of a Roman Legion which emerged from the wall, proceeded by the sound of a trumpet. It then exited through the opposite wall, he fled in terror.

He later accurately described their authentic appearance. All was described by a National Trust guide. I also spotted Dan Snow on location, surrounded by his camera crew.



Finally, I walked the well preserved medieval walls, giving delightful views of it all from above. My stay at the Alquin Guest House was very enjoyable, hosted by the knowledgeable and attractive Darren.

Four days was not nearly enough. Ernie
