
Cruising down the river on a Sunday afternoon!

Theatre Review

inky Boots. Back in June we reported on the 2006 film production of Kinky Boots, this has captured the imagination of many, but it was a drama without music. It is now to be seen as a musical on the West End stage and this week it has been nominated for an award.

If you can imagine a somewhat run down factory in Northampton churning out old-fashioned shoes that nobody wants to buy, this then, is the setting for Kinky Boots which is based on a true story. Charlie the son of the proprietor, Mr. Price, wants nothing to do with the chaos, and with his girlfriend leaves to live in London. On arrival he is greeted with the news that his father has passed away, and that he must return immediately to take over the running of the business.

This he does with much reluctance and begins to look at ways of turning the company around and to make it viable. The answer appears in the unlikely form of a black Drag Queen, Lola, a cabaret artiste with her troupe of six outrageous but athletic drag queenettes.

Lola wants red calf-length boots with stiletto heels that will take the weight of herself- a grown man— Charlie and Lola together design the boots that she requires following many mishaps in the factory. She also wants similar boots quickly for her queenettes. The new footwear needs to be shown for potential world-wide markets, and attendance at a Milan shoe exhibition is crucial for long term success. There are no less than 15 songs in the show many of them performed by the glamorous queenettes: they are simply superb with their fantastic make-up, colourful costumes/ frocks, athletic high-kick dancing and comedy routines. There is of course sexual innuendos but no smut or decadence. With music and lyrics by Cyndi Lauper, book by Harvey Fierstein, and MATT HENRY as Lola this show is a sure-fire hit. For a good night out at the theatre, I would not hesitate to recommend this seductive show.

Another Retrospective

ew York was once littered with public bathhouses. The last of them closed in the 1970s. But one can still find many of the buildings they used to occupy in plain sight. The old bathhouse on E. 11th Street near Avenue B and what is now called the Brooklyn Lyceum on Fourth Avenue in Brooklyn are two prominent examples.

This off-white, not so terribly grand looking structure was the Everard Baths. It was not a public bath, but a commercial bath. It operated from 1888 to 1985. It was founded by James Everard, a wealthy financier brewer. The building actually had a previous purpose, as a church. So I guess the building itself is actually older than 1888. At the time, 28th Street was a swell location. The theatre district was in nearby Herald Square and there were many swanky hotels in the area. Everard had private "steam cabinets" and several different styles of bathhouses. The place had a rocky history. (All bath houses did. Get a bunch of naked strangers in one building and something untoward is bound to happen eventually.) A soldier was found dead here in 1898. A manager and nine patrons were arrested in 1919 for lewd behaviour. Another raid came the next year.

In 1921, the baths were sold to one Abraham Harawitz, who promised \$100,000 in improvements.

By the 1920s, it became a gathering place for the gay community. Some of its celebrated patrons included Emlyn Williams, Alfred Lunt, Gore Vidal, Rudolf Nureyev, Truman Capote, Larry Kramer, Ned Rorem and Lorenz Hart. As such, it is perhaps the most written-about gay bathhouse in New York history.

Tragedy struck on May 25, 1977, when a fire broke out. Nine people died. Amazing the two destroyed floors were rebuilt and the baths reopened, but Mayor Ed Koch closed Everard for good in April 1986. In recent years, the space has been many things. I went to a play here in the late '90s.
