Chairs Annual report

015 was a year for change for GayWest and with the gay community as a whole. Some organisations this year have found it hard to maintain their profiles and funding. This is always the most problematic area to be able to secure or predict.

The committee are all aware of this and a lot of discussions are brought about on these issues.

Towards the end of 2014 we were struggling to find the funds so we could improve or develop a new Website, then at the end of November 2014 an e-mail dropped into my mail box from St. John's Hospital in Bath who were launching grants for locally based social groups. We applied and were amazed to be awarded the maximum amount of £3000.00p. GayWest was also lucky to find that the company who designed and built our new website were looking for someone to test their own internal club chatroom. This we have done and it has enabled us to have a top class website at way below the normally expected costs.

The site will need constant upgrading and work is being done at present with the recently new GayWest Facebook page and Twitter accounts being added. We have also had to add our Cookies Policy which is required by EU law now and again this cost of £150.00p plus VAT has been met by the company, who also host the site for us. So we owe them a huge thankyou for their help with this.

Unfortunately the committee does not have any "techies" so we are all learning a great deal about administrating a live website which at present is being managed by "silver surfers".

The main thing with any organisation like GayWest is we need to keep our members and recruit new ones for the group to survive. The new website has helped with this. We have had new members join us via the site and this is exactly what our brief was to the IT company.

2015 saw an increase in GayWest attending events apart from the usual Gay Prides, which this year were Bristol, Gloucester and Weston-S-Mare.

n a bright October morning, twenty walkers gathered at the Cotswold village of Hawksbury Upton, near Badminton. We set off towards Petty France, with views towards Dunkirk, both of which were named by Flemish weavers who settled in this area during the medieval period. Turning to the west on a grassy track, we eventually reached Horton Camp, which is an unusual set of Iron Age earthworks, formed by only two defensive ramparts, the remaining third side being formed by the steep hillside.



After a stop on the ramparts to have our picnic lunches in the sunshine and to admire the panoramic views over the Severn Vale, we followed the Cotswold Way for a short stretch. On our steep descent towards the village of Horton, we passed a splendid country house and a folly. Although the folly appeared to be quite ancient from a distance, it was in fact built in 2000 as a nesting place for swallows and barn owls.

A series of field footpaths led us on to the imposing parish of St James the Less at Horton, where most of the group had a look around.

he church adjoins Horton Court, a medieval National Trust property, which is currently undergoing restoration, and is sadly closed to visitors, however, a Norman arch facing the church was seen from the churchyard. A quiet lane took us along the lower slopes of the Cotswolds, giving good views along the valley and plenty of autumn tints.

For every steep descent there is a steep ascent! The path now took up steeply through trees and fields back to the village, leading, purely by coincidence, straight to the back door of the Beaufort Arms pub, where many of our party repaired for a drink.

After 1967 and as the age of consent was lowered, a sense started to prevail, at least in the UK. (I even spotted it in Conditions of Acceptance of Leaders) that gay and lesbian applicants were welcome too.

However, in the USA, until quite recently "avowed homosexual adults and children" would not be allowed to join the American Scout Association or BSA. Believe it or not the ban still exists on adults from the age of 18. As a result of this, on attaining this age, a scout must leave the movement irrespective of his previous impeccable behaviour!

The US Defence Secretary, Robert Gates, who decides such matters, will not relent, as he is of the opinion that—"This might lead ultimately to the demise of the BSA". Guess where such prejudice originates!

I am pleased though, to say that in the UK, gay scout leaders have formed a group called FLAGS Scouts. This actively encourages all LGBT persons, young and old, male or female to participate in scouting, without discrimination.

"Scouting is for everyone". There is a Rainbow scout scarf to wear in addition to one's own group scarf. There have been many LGBT scouting contingents as part of Pride Marches. Such participation was announced in advance of marches.
