The Biograph Cinema

he Biograph Cinema in Wilton Road, Victoria, London was one of the first cinemas to be built in the UK and it opened as THE ELECTRIC THEATRE on 24th May 1909.

It was built for Biograph Theatre Ltd., the first of a small chain operated by an American named George Washington Grant who had taken over five existing cinemas in London. The seating capacity was for 560 on one level.

A plaque on the foyer wall for many years incorrectly stated "BIOGRAPH 1905 England's first cinema. Originally called Bioscope, the first name for cinema".

A press release in 1965 stated (again incorrectly) that it opened in March 1905 and was the first cinema to be granted a licence under the Cinematograph Act.

It was extensively rebuilt in 1927 under the plans of architect George Coles. The auditorium was widened to seat 630 (with standing room for 124) and a stage, dressing rooms and a new proscenium was added.

It was renamed THE BIOGRAPH and operated by the Hyams Brothers. The first film with sound shown here was SHOW BOAT on 30th September 1929. During the war the cinema was closed for a short period due to bomb damage and the staff rooms and offices were lost.

The Biograph quickly re-opened with live variety acts as part of the programme. There was a change of programme three times a week, which gave film buffs a chance to catch up on missed movies. In 1952 Kenneth Williams visiting "in the hope of traditional entertainment" complained bitterly, after finding it "terribly desolate".

In the 1960's the cinema was doing good business, helped by the fact that it had become a gay men's meeting place, and was nicknamed

he Metropolitan Police's increased surveillance of public lavatories drove men looking to "pick up" into the comfort and darkness of the cinema. Men would often change seats to sit next to a young man.

Admission around 1964 was 2/6d (half-a-crown) about 13p in today's money & coinage. And very good value too! Following an article in the News of the World headlined "Close Down This Cinema of Vice", the reporter wrote descriptively about the activity there and the constant moving from seat to seat by the audience and frequent visits to the gent's toilet. Despite this expose, nothing happened apart from the appointment of a bouncer, and the films continued with the house lights raised slightly. The cruising continued and the occasional "tourist" would be lured in by the programme, to see what was going on and to have their money refunded. An eye-witness (who wishes to remain anonymous) confirmed to me 'that there were nonstop bodily movements in the stalls and because of the sticky mess on the floor, the wearing of wellington boots was advised!'

Although claimed as the oldest cinema in England, it was not listed due to its pre- and post-war modernisation: The owners (must have) panicked and on August 1983 the cinema closed down and demolition started immediately, and only the site remained after two weeks. It remained derelict for the next twenty years when a small hotel was built on the site.

Story of Joe.... Part 1

ew in 1969 would have imagined that a mere two decades after the Stonewall riots, two men would marry in a ceremony recognized and sanctioned by their national government. The right to marry is one of many rights that gay men and women have campaigned for and won in the years since Stonewall, rights that cover every aspect of our daily lives-at home, at work, at play, and in between the sheets.

The fight for gay rights: one man's story

This is the story of Joe Stonewall, born in the early hours of the morning of June 28th, 1969. He's not a real person, of course, but through his imaginary birth and life, we can trace the evolution of gay rights from the time of the riots to the dawn of the new millennium. He would have been coming into this world when the Stonewall riots were in full swing. The question is: Was little Joe born homosexual or did something make him "gay" at some point between birth and his first sexual encounter with a man? This is a very important issue and as such is a subject that is still hotly debated today.

Born not made: the genetics argument

The basis for the "essentialist" position is that homosexuality is a "natural" inherited trait, much like eye or skin colour, through the presence of one or more "gay" genes. From the early 19th-century European Homophile movement to the late 1960s pre-Stonewall Gay Rights campaigners often portrayed homosexuals as victims of a natural "abnormality" who, like other sufferers from other genetic disorders, should be pitied for a condition they could do nothing about rather than persecuted.

The latest advances in genetics, which have allowed scientists to identify and manipulate genes, have also raised the spectre of screening the population for "undesirables" genes such as being gay.

roof of their theories has so far eluded the pro-genetics camp, apart from the rather obvious question of why a gene that discourages its own sexual reproduction could survive in the population. There is as yet, no single satisfactory theory to account for a process as diverse and complex as the development of human sexuality.

Joe goes to school. Joe Stonewall goes to infant school and....To be continued next month.

There are others who have to tell everyone they meet that they are gay, which must be difficult for the person getting this information which they didn't maybe wish to know.

All rights have been hard to gain and should be cherished as should all our brothers and sisters, **but most importantly always be true to yourself.**
