A Rough Guide to Running cost of Gaywest

s you know GayWest is a completely self-funding organization and all income comes from its Members/Supporters, Auctions/ raffles, and donations. Applications for a grant has been successful in the past.

The aim in this area is to be able to fund all what we do during the year and remain solvent at the end of that year. Not having to make a profit, but not wanting to be running at a loss. This is not the easiest job to do even at this time of fairly steady cost rises, so what is involved?

The year ending 31^{st} July 2016 from which our accounts are calculated each year show that last year GayWest ran at a loss of just over £300.00p for the year. So it is vital that we find ways to reduce our cost or increase our revenue. There are a few ways in which to achieve this. You can all buy more coffee and cakes at the Cafe, buy more raffle tickets etc. We are hoping this year we can raise funds by putting on the fun day event in 2017 as mentioned last month.

The figures for the cafe do not include the cost for the beverages you purchase, these are bought from any takings above what it cost to run the Cafe and donations. Your committee will do all it can to keep the cost for membership and beverages at the cafe at its present level but can not guarantee this. We have been lucky that we have had a couple of generous donations, but we need to make up the rest of **£1500.00** to keep our heads above water.
